Hope, Loss and Hope Again

Lola Rebuilds a Life for her and Timur after Losing her Husband to Cancer

Lola had been living in Springfield for only a few months when her young husband, Azamat, was diagnosed with stage 2 brain cancer. It was devastating news for the young couple. Their extended family lived in Uzbekistan and, as recent immigrants, they didn't have a community of friends to rely upon. Azamat started treatment immediately. Over a period of several years, he survived 2 surgeries and endured months of chemo and radiation. After a valiant battle, Azamat passed away, survived by young Lola and their 3-year old son, Timur.



Lola often pauses to dry her tears when she talks about Azamat. The loss feels so fresh and life as a single mom is so difficult. She has been making her way though. She works full-time at a preschool and is taking a computer programming class at night. "My friends took this class and they found good jobs. So I would like to do the same. It would be good for my future." Her friends help with Timur. "He wants to play when I have to study. He is so active and runs up and down the hallways of our apartment building with the other kids."

The stress of being a single mom is often worst in the summer. Lola explained, "Timur does not want to go back to the daycare at my office. He is older than the babies and bored. He has no other kids his age to play with." That's why she turned to Wildflower.

When Lola first applied for support from Wildflower, she was placed on our waitlist. Program Director Audrey Loria explained, "Wildflower supports as many families as we can, but we are limited by how much funding is available."

Despite her waitlist status, Lola was matched with a volunteer liaison who introduced Lola to the Longfellow Health Summer Camp, a camp that was close to Lola's home, offered extended hours and kept the campers very active. Lola believed it would be a perfect fit except for one thing—the tuition. Wildflower's Audrey Loria reached out to Longfellow to share Lola's story and ask about placement for Timur. They were so moved by Lola's struggle that they offered a full camp scholarship.

Longfellow's generosity made it possible for Timur to attend camp for the first time last summer. He loved it! He loved swimming every day and being with a big group of kids his age. And Lola loved it, too. She was so happy to see Timur's smiling face each morning as he anticipated another fun day at camp.

More good news arrived in May. The Cummings Foundation selected Wildflower to receive a "\$100K for 100" grant. The additional funding enabled Wildflower to extend our full services to every single family on last year's waitlist. For Lola, that means she will be able to rely upon Wildflower for summer camp placement, scholarship assistance and consistent support every year, for as long as her family needs our help. With Wildflower by her side, Lola will be able to look forward to summer as a time of joy for Timur and respite for herself.
